#### LOCAL AUTHORITY

Restore the right of a community to determine its educational and spending priorities through its locally elected and accountable board of education

Reject attempts to further restrict local control of the publics' schools

Relieve schools of legislative, statutory and regulatory impediments to cost-saving strategies and initiatives

#### Reform New York's Tax Levy Cap Law

- Repeal the financial punishment of a zero increase tax levy cap the state would mete out to schools as a consequence of a defeated school budget
- · Eliminate possibility of a negative tax cap
- Restore democratic principle of "one person, one vote", repeal supermajority requirement for school budget votes
- . Include properties covered by PILOTs in the tax base growth factor
- Include BOCES capital cost in the local capital expense exclusion from the cap
- Provide that cost increases attributable to citizen referenda not force a supermajority requirement upon tax cap-compliant school budgets
- Revoke the denial of rebates to taxpayers in tax cap-compliant school districts due to non-compliance of other local governments
- Reject proposal of state-mandated building level aid distribution mechanism as unwarranted state interference into the efficient management and local governance of suburban school districts
- Maintain ability of school boards to present capital bond referenda for a vote at a date they determine to be most fiscally responsible
- Grant traditional public schools the flexibility and relief from state regulations as are granted to charter schools
- Require official notification to affected school districts in advance of Industrial Development Agency (IDA) action on planned projects; grant school districts formal representation on IDA boards
- Maintain requirement of a local referendum for the merger of school districts; provide incentive aid and adequate transition funding for school district consolidation
- Restore to locally accountable BOCES boards of education the responsibility to determine the District Superintendent's salary and benefits

# YEAR 2019 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association seeks legislative action that would protect and sustain Long Island's highly regarded public schools.

- Shield Long Island schools and taxpayers from negative impact resulting from capping of <u>State</u> and <u>Local Tax Deductions</u> on federal tax filings (<u>SALT-D</u>)
- Honor state's promise to provide substantive mandate relief
- Properly fund the state's share of escalating costs for the demonstrable increases in student mental health and safety needs and the educational needs of English Language Learners
- Address <u>deficiencies in</u> <u>Foundation Aid Formula</u> in order to assure adequate funding for the Long Island region
- Provide <u>sufficient state funding</u> to cover established current year <u>costs</u>, new state mandates and <u>loss of local revenues</u> <u>attributable to New York's school</u> tax levy cap

Long Island school districts face mounting challenges in addressing the unprecedented escalation in needs of today's student population.

Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association calls upon the state to fulfill its obligation to adequately fund public education in order that boards of education may fulfill their responsibility to secure the educational and fiscal integrity of their communities' schools.

### SCHOOL FINANCE

It is the joint responsibility of the State and its localities to fund New York's public schools. To maintain the public's confidence and to address impediments to the efficient utilization of taxpayer funds, the Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association calls upon the State to:

- Mitigate the negative impact of cap on State and Local Tax Deductibility (SALT-D) on Long Island schools and property taxpayers
- Establish that public funds should support core public education and not be diverted for private school vouchers, education or tuition tax credits or towards the expansion of services and financial assistance to private, parochial and charter schools
- Provide sufficient state funding to cover established current year costs, new state initiatives and loss of local revenues attributable to New York's school tax levy cap
- Utilize regional cost and wealth factors that more accurately balance state aid distributions with a community's ability to pay
- Address deficiencies in the Foundation Aid Formula that deny Long Island an equitable share of state aid; eliminate disparity between high and low wealth districts by leveling up
- Reject proposals to consolidate and cap expense-driven aids; maintain and fully fund BOCES, transportation and private excess cost as separate, expense-based aids
- Provide current year funding for costs related to increases in enrollment of English Language Learners (ELL) and students with special needs
- Provide targeted funding to assist schools' compliance with increased requirements under PL 154 for reporting and delivery of English Language Learners (ELL) and bilingual education services
- Rectify the state's underfunding of Long Island's Pre-K needs; expand sustainable Pre-K funding to all interested school districts; provide maximum flexibility to districts to determine their Pre-K options; aid Pre-K transportation at same level as K-12

#### SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY

- Increase state's share of costs to address escalating costs for demonstrable increases in student mental health needs
- Increase state funding for school safety and security measures
- Require consent of school districts for use of school buildings as polling places
- Fund Recovery High School on Long Island to be administered by BOCES

#### MANDATE RELIEF

- Honor the state's promise to accompany its local tax levy cap with substantive relief from costly mandates
- Require that all Bills contain a full disclosure of local cost and tax impact as determined by the Office of the State Comptroller
- Delay implementation date of new mandates until year following next school budget vote in order that costs not be taken from current school program
- Provide targeted funding to assist compliance with PL 154 increased requirements for services to English Language Learners (ELL) and bi-lingual education
- Mitigate special education costs by conforming state laws and regulations with those of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA)
- Amend the Triborough Amendment to the Taylor Law's Triborough Doctrine, ending automatic step and lane increases beyond expiration of a contract
- Repeal the wasteful, arcane Wicks Law that continues to drive up construction costs; allow schools to utilize Dormitory Authority or Design-Build funding options

#### **ENABLE GREATER EFFICIENCIES**

- Promptly process and release monies due school districts for Smart Schools Bond Act projects
- Provide adequate funding to facilitate NYSED approvals of capital project plans
- Increase the allowable fund balance limit above the current level
- Permit school districts and BOCES to establish reserve funds for Teachers Retirement System (TRS)
- Permit school districts to create tax stabilization reserve funds
- Lift cap on reimbursement of BOCES Aid for Career and Technical Education (CTE) teachers in order to lower tuition costs for local school districts

#### ANNUAL PROFESSIONAL PERFORMANCE REVIEW (APPR)

- > Return responsibility for evaluating teachers and principals to local control
- Eliminate mandate to use state assessments in APPR or the use of any single highstakes test as the sole measure of student or school achievement; recognize validity of multiple measures of assessment
- Delink student assessments and staff evaluations from state aid; eliminate potential fiscal penalty for not meeting 95% student participation rate
- > Eliminate mandate to employ independent observers for evaluations

# YEAR 2019 FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

Nassau-Suffolk School Boards Association
calls upon Long Island's Delegation to the 116th Congress
to commit its full support to measures that honor and protect the investments
Long Islanders have made in building and sustaining a region with highly regarded public schools

#### FEDERAL ISSUES

- Fully restore deductibility of state and local taxes (SALT-D) on federal tax filings; advance and promote H.R.188 (SALT Deductibility Act) and H.R. 257 (retroactively restore full SALT deduction)
- > Substantially increase funding for Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) in order that Congress may move towards honoring its original intention of fully funding 40% of excess costs
- Recognize **regional cost and wealth factors** in determining federal aid distribution; renew efforts to **create cost-of-living adjustments** to the **federal tax code**
- ▶ Provide immediate and ongoing federal resources for districts experiencing increases in enrollment of unaccompanied minors and Students with Interrupted Formal Education (SIFE)
- Direct significant increases in federal funding to address school safety initiatives, including mental health and the social and emotional needs of students
- ▶ Prioritize federal investments in Title I and Title II which are critical for proper implementation of Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)
- Protect funding for school-based Medicaid
- > Protect school access to online materials and resources; support net neutrality and 21st Century Internet Act
- Maintain **Title IV funding** for **21**<sup>st</sup> **Century Community Learning Centers** that provide critically needed after-school programs and services to promote **safe and drug-free** alternatives
- Defeat all attempts to establish private school vouchers, tuition tax credits and the expansion of services and financial assistance to private, parochial or charter schools; oppose redirection of Impact Aid Program towards Education Savings Accounts (ESAs)

Ensure that local school districts have greater flexibility to make educationally sound decisions and be free of mandates that unnecessarily or counterproductively hinder school districts from achieving their goals
