THE COMMUNITY

Huntington is a culturally diverse, residential, suburban community on the north shore of Long Island, 37 miles from New York City. Students enjoy all of the cultural, educational and recreational advantages of the metropolitan area.

THE SCHOOL

Huntington High School is a four-year comprehensive public school, accredited by the Middle States Association of Secondary Schools and the New York State Board of Regents. Classes meet for either a semester (20 weeks) or a full year (40 weeks). The present senior class has 268 students. The total school enrollment is 1,211 and the CEEB Code is 332-490.

GRADING

The grade-point average is the average of all grades, including summer school, earned by a student by September of their senior year. A half-year course has half the value of a one-credit course. Thus, the average of English 9 (1 credit) 90, and Global Studies 9 (1 credit) 90, and Criminal Justice (1/2 credit) 81, is 88.2 (not 87).

Advanced Placement Courses listed below receive a weight of 1.10 in the GPA calculation. Honors and College courses listed below receive a weight of 1.075 in the GPA calculation. Thus a grade of 95 has a value of 104.5 in an Advanced Placement course and a value of 102.1 in an Honors or College course. Accelerated courses receive a weighting of 1.05 in GPA. If a student drops a course prior to the mid-point of the course, no record of this is placed on the transcript and hence it is not included in the GPA. All credit-bearing courses are counted. Grades of WP, WF, NG, P, or F are not counted. Students who repeat a course have the higher grade entered once.

RANK

Beginning with the Class of 2004, Huntington High School has adopted a policy of *not* ranking students based on their cumulative grade-point average, relative to their classmates.

WEIGHTING

The final grade in all courses as they appear on the transcript is unweighted. However, grades in Advanced Placement courses listed below are multiplied by 1.1 when computing a student's GPA.

STATE ASSESSMENTS

LOCAL DIPLOMA—Must score 65 or above on 3 required Regents exams and must score between 55 and 64 on two Regent exams. Required exams: English, Global History, US History, Math A or Integrated Algebra and Science.

REGENTS DIPLOMA—Must score 65 or higher on each of the following Regent Exams: English, Global History, US History, Math A or Integrated Algebra, and Science.

REGENTS DIPLOMA with ADVANCED DESIGNATION—Must score 65 or higher on each of the following Regent Exams: English, Global History, US History, two math regents (Math A and Math B or Math A and Algebra 2/Trigonometry), Living Environment, a Physical Setting Science, and LOTE.

* Language Other Than English (LOTE): Students must earn one high school credit by the end of grade 9. The 3 units of credit required in LOTE for the Advanced Regents Diploma may also be met by completing 1 credit in LOTE and 5 units of credit in one of the following: Art, Music or Career and Technical Education.
