THE COMMUNITY

Huntington is a vibrant, culturally diverse suburban community with a population of approximately 30,000 residents. Situated on the scenic north shore of Long Island, just 37 miles east of New York City, Huntington offers students the unique opportunity to experience the cultural, educational, and recreational resources of both a close-knit community and a world-class metropolitan area. The town's strong commitment to education is reflected in its broad range of academic and extracurricular programs, which are enriched by the active support of families and community organizations.

HUNTINGTON HIGH SCHOOL

Huntington High School is a four-year comprehensive public school accredited by the Middle States Association of Secondary Schools and the New York State Board of Regents. Serving approximately 1,311 students in grades 9–12, including 373 seniors, the school offers a rigorous academic program with a broad range of Advanced Placement, honors, dual-enrollment, and elective courses. Huntington High School provides students with challenging opportunities that prepare them to transition successfully into post-secondary education and to meet the demands of colleges, universities, and future careers.

CURRICULUM

Huntington High School requires a minimum of 22 credits for graduation, including coursework in English, social studies, mathematics, science, world language, fine arts, health, physical education, and electives. Honors courses are available in most disciplines, and students in grades 9–12 may select from a wide range of Advanced Placement offerings. Beginning in grade 9, students also have the opportunity to participate in the school's nationally recognized science research program, which encourages sustained study and independent investigation throughout their high school career.

CLASS RANK

In accordance with Huntington Board of Education policy, students are not ranked by cumulative GPA. Transcripts, however, reflect weighted GPAs to recognize the rigor of courses and programs, including Regents, Honors, College, and Advanced Placement offerings.

COURSE WEIGHTING

The final grade in all courses as they appear on the transcript is unweighted. At the completion of each year, a weighted grade point average (GPA) is determined. The weighted GPA is calculated by multiplying the final grade for each course by the appropriate course credit and weighting factor and then averaging the resulting grades.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR PROGRAMS

Huntington High School offers a robust interscholastic athletics program, with approximately 65% of students participating across 34 varsity and 16 junior varsity teams. Since 2008, student-athletes have achieved over 121 league, county, Long Island, state, and two national championships, with roughly 85% earning honor roll recognition each quarter.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

- **Student Internship Program** Open to seniors, this program provides opportunities for enrichment beyond the traditional academic experience. Students explore career interests and develop creative projects under the guidance of a mentor.
- **Special Education** Students with identified needs receive individualized education programs and targeted support to ensure both challenge and success.
- **Virtual Enterprise** A collaborative, hands-on course that immerses students in real-world business and entrepreneurship experiences.
- **Dual Language Program** Offers students the opportunity to develop proficiency in a second language while supporting academic achievement across the curriculum.
- **AP Capstone Diploma Program** A rigorous, research- and seminar-based program that complements AP coursework and develops critical thinking, research, and presentation skills for students pursuing advanced academic study.
- Video Broadcasting Sequence A four-year program designed for students interested in media, journalism, and production. Students gain practical experience in video editing, broadcasting, and live production while developing technical, creative, and communication skills. The sequence culminates in advanced coursework that prepares students for college study or careers in media-related fields

GRADE 12 PHYSICAL EDUCATION EXEMPTION OPTION

Seniors participating in a varsity athletic team may choose to enroll in a regular physical education class or request an exemption for the duration of their sports season. Students approved for this exemption receive a pass/fail grade for the marking period and semester during which they are excused from physical education, while still fulfilling graduation requirements.

NYS REGENTS EXAMINATION EXEMPTIONS AND SPECIAL APPEALS

In accordance with New York State Education Department directives related to COVID-19, students who passed a course culminating in a Regents or Checkpoint World Language Assessment may be marked with an "E" for exemption. This also applies to students granted a Major Life Exemption for significant personal or family circumstances. Additionally, Regents examinations that were appealed due to potential learning disruptions are designated with an "SA" for Special Appeal.

GRADE 12 PHYSICAL EDUCATION EXEMPTION OPTION

Seniors participating in a varsity athletic team may choose to enroll in a regular physical education class or request an exemption for the duration of their sports season. Students approved for this exemption receive a pass/fail grade for the marking period and semester during which they are excused from physical education, while still fulfilling graduation requirements.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM

Huntington High School offers a comprehensive Advanced Placement (AP) program designed to challenge students and prepare them for college-level work. AP courses are available to students in grades 9–12 across a wide range of subjects, including English, mathematics, science, social studies, world languages, and the arts. The program emphasizes critical thinking, analytical writing, and independent research, allowing students to engage deeply with rigorous content. Weighted grades for AP courses are reflected on transcripts to recognize the increased academic challenge, and many students earn college credit or advanced placement based on their AP exam performance.

AP CAPSTONE PROGRAM

Huntington High School offers the AP Capstone program, a two-year sequence of courses—AP Seminar and AP Research—designed to equip students with the independent research, critical thinking, and collaborative problem-solving skills essential for college and beyond. Open to students in grades 10–12, the program complements traditional AP coursework by emphasizing inquiry-based learning, academic writing, and presentation skills. Students who complete both courses and earn qualifying scores, in addition to four other AP exams, may receive the AP Capstone Diploma, a distinction recognized by colleges and universities worldwide. Weighted grades for AP Capstone courses are reflected on transcripts to acknowledge the rigorous academic challenge.

DUAL ENROLLMENT PROGRAM

Huntington High School partners with colleges and universities to offer Dual Enrollment courses that allow students to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously. These courses are taught by Huntington faculty who meet the qualifications set by the partner institutions and follow college-level curricula. Dual Enrollment provides students with an authentic college experience while still in high school, helping them build academic confidence and reduce future college costs. Weighted grades for Dual Enrollment courses are reflected on transcripts, and credits earned may be transferable to a wide range of colleges and universities.

COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS – CLASS OF 2025

Huntington High School students demonstrate strong standardized test performance, with mean SAT scores of 546 in Mathematics (national mean 530) and 569 in Evidence-Based Reading and Writing (national mean 480). The mean ACT composite score is 26.3, compared to the national mean of 19.
