

It's a Bird, It's a Plane...

No! It's a UAV! And It's Coming for a Special Delivery

You have just ordered a new hat online, but instead of waiting three business days for it to arrive at your front step, it is dropped off in your backyard by a drone a mere hour later. In today's day and age, you may seem this is an impossible feat only to be realized in the distant future, but this technology is far from futuristic, and is very much a possible occurrence. In recent years, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) have been greatly improved and have gained media attention for their use by the military, hobbyists, and businesses. What exactly is a UAV, or drone, however?

UAVs can be any flying vehicle that does not have a pilot, and can be anything from a large Predator drone that can remotely attack terrorists overseas with missiles to small, electrically powered helicopters or multicopters that can take selfies. In this article, electric multicopters, or basically helicopters with more than one rotor, will mainly be discussed. The most advanced multicopter

manufacturer may be the Chinese based company DJI, who recently released a new quadcopter (multicopter with four rotors) called the INSPIRE1 (see picture). This quadcopter is the most advanced commercial aerial photography platform of its type, and features a 4K built in camera with optical image stabilization, GPS, and the ability to land by itself.

Compared to the hefty \$3000 price tag the INSPIRE1 carries, other drones such as the Parrot AR are optimized for amateur flyers with a lower price of around \$300.

The simple vehicles that Parrot manufactures are equipped with Wi-Fi which allows them to be controlled via an app on your smartphone, and cameras to live stream video being taken from the

vehicle.

Other than aerial photography and hobby use, multicopters have been used for transportation of goods such as medicine and even commercial products. Matternet, a relatively new startup from Scotland, plan to begin an ambitious project to establish a transportation network across Sub-

net, Amazon has revealed a new planned service called Amazon Prime Air which promises to deliver packages to customers in 30 minutes or less. Their drones would be able to deliver small packages to the front yards to anyone within a 30 minute radius of an Amazon distribution center. As the CEO of Matternet stated in his most recent TED talk,

"For those of you who still believe it is science fiction, I firmly say to you that it is not."

Although the technology may exist to implement these systems into everyday life, there are some major limitations, more specifically in the United States, the government. The Federal Aviation Administration, or FAA, promised in 2012 to release regulations for UAV's by

September 2015, and they released their preliminary rules earlier this month. These new regulations will be able to be commented on as all new FAA regulations are, by visiting the FAA website, until discussion ends late next year when the final rules are established. The proposed regulations are restrictive towards commercial drone users, and require commercial operators of drones under 55 pounds to have a certified pilot license, only fly during the daytime, and within line of sight of the UAV. In addition, all UAVS must fly below an altitude of 400 feet and cannot fly within four miles of an airport. These strict regulations have been prompted by numerous commercial airline pilots reporting near collisions with drones flying well above the current altitude limit of 400 feet, potentially endangering the plane and all the passengers inside. Hopefully, these regulations to do not sideline the development and expansion of drone technology, and someday, your package may be deliv-



Saharan Africa. One billion people in the world do not have access to roads, and Matternet plans to reach these people using drones that deliver medicine and have the ability to transport goods both to and from markets. Their drones can carry up to 2 kilograms, and travel 10 kilometers in 15 minutes. Similar to Matternet,

Ocean Acidification: A Threat to Our World

Since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution, carbon dioxide emissions have added to the global crisis of atmospheric overheating. Global warming has caused worry and general angst amongst scientists for years, but now a new problem is emerging, one that came along with global warming but never was fully acknowledged. Now, however, this crisis threatens to exceed global warming with potential disastrous effects and widespread repercussions. This is ocean acidification.

Ocean acidification is the process in which increased levels of CO₂, in its aqueous state of carbonic acid, enters the ocean from the atmosphere and alters seawater pH and creates lasting results on our oceans and their ecosystems.

Perhaps the most important outcome is a disruption in the shell forming

habits of pelagic (marine) organisms. When these unwanted emissions enter the water, this reduces the amount of calcium carbonate ions, a key component for the process of calcification in coastal creatures, basically meaning it is difficult for marine organisms to form their outer shells. This is especially prevalent in pteropods, or sea butterflies, and in a recent study, their shells completely dissolved in under fifty days after being in an environment with the predicted carbonic acid levels for 2050. During several scientific experiments, scientists found that over the past 300 million years, seawater pH has been slightly basic, around 8.2. However, today it is around 8.1, which is a huge drop on the pH scale, as carbonic acid now represents almost 400 ppm (parts per million) and that number is rapidly growing, with no notable end. This problem needs to be addressed now in order to help salvage our oceans, but there is one way to tell what may happen when the oceans shift from basic to more acidic.

Off of the coast of Italy, a small island by the name of Costello Arogonese lies amongst the clear blue waters and stunning scenery. The island is regularly visited above ground to witness the unique old history from hundreds of years ago that remain untouched on the island, such as crumbling building and historic homes. But beneath the surface, something far more sinister lurks. Something that not backpedals into the past, but tells the tale of a far darker future.

Due to a quirk in geography, volcanic vents bubble out CO₂ from the ocean floor surrounding Castello Arogonese. Scientists purvey and examine these waters, as they give a glimpse into what our oceans could

potentially become by 2050 and beyond. Carbonic acid is nothing but tasteless seltzer to us, so scientists swim these waters with ease amongst sea grass and nothing else. Due to the high acidity levels, all that remains on the sea floor is dull sea grass drifting and swaying with the current, and the occasional skeleton of an unfortunate crab who wandered into the wrong part of the sea.

Other predicted oceanic effects may be:

- Collapse of main food chains from the loss of bottom-feeding calcifiers
- Sea urchins protect coral reefs, but have been known to shrink and deform with added acidity.
- Bleaching of coral reefs, the main food sources and ecosystems for pelagic organisms of all kinds.
- Human food sources may be threatened by the loss of some creatures that react

negatively to acid.

- Different reports show results of experimentation in which some organisms formed their shells more rapidly.
- In the above report, 10 out of 17 pteropods, the majority, experienced a decreased calcification rate.
- Once the ocean is at its maximum holding level of CO₂, it will leave the ocean and alter climates dramatically.

Ocean acidification is a threat that scientists need to address now if we want to help save the worlds oceans. After all, we rely on our oceans all the time to help with everyday life. We could potentially end global warming and rescue the seas from imminent peril.

Lack of Z's, Lack of A's

Research shows that it is an innate tendency for teenagers to stay up late at night and wake up later in the morning. So, if this is true it begs the question, why doesn't school start later?

When I asked my friends how they felt about having to wake up early for school I got varied responses, a little violence—a little profanity.

"When I wake up for school in the morning, I feel like I'm gonna cry because I'm so tired," said junior Gabby Pellechia.

"I want to gouge my eyes out," were the words of sophomore Chloe Liepa.

"Emotionally unstable," sophomore Anna Gulizio told me. While these statements are obviously meant to be comical, it does show just how tedious and unenjoyably waking up for school can be.

Recently, there has been much talk about why schools should push back their hours by at least an hour. In August, right before school started, the American Academy of Pediatrics published a new policy statement entitled, "School Start Times for Adolescents". In the statement, they conveyed the proven idea that teens have sleep patterns that can be up to two hours later

than adults and children.

They ultimately implored schools to start later stating that the customary early start time could be a contributing component to chronic sleep deprivation among adolescents. It is believed that if kids weren't so tired they could not only retain more information, but it could prevent car accidents, depres-

sion, bad grades and anxiety. However, this isn't the first stride towards later school starting times. Since the 1990's, research concerning adolescent sleep and wake patterns has been conducted by many groups including the National Sleep Foundation. The conclusion has long been drawn that the earliest most teenagers are awake and properly functioning is 8 am.

On April 2 of 1999, a congressional proposal was introduced to urge schools and school districts to reconsider early morning start

times to be more in sync with teens' sleeping patterns. House Congressional Resolution 135 or the "ZZZ's to A's" Act would encourage individual schools and school districts all over the country to move school start times to no earlier than 8:30 a.m.

In 43 states, school districts heeded the advice of doctors and returned school hours to healthier times. Although some scheduling issues have arisen, it has been found to be ultimately constructive. In New York, places like Ithaca and Elmira have pushed their times back to 8:30 and 8:50.

However, 43% of schools in the country still start before 8 am. Still many schools such as ours refuse to push time back in order not to interfere

with extracurricular activities. This is a valid problem, however schools should find ways to fix sports and clubs around later school starting times because many students such as senior Greg West believe that starting school later "would provide students with a much more efficient learning experience because they would get more sleep," and frankly, sports and clubs can only get better as a result of well rested, happier participants.







The sun had just set and as you can see, the electric lights on the dock were just beginning to turn on. Album Review: *Salad Days*

Two Thumbs Up For Mac DeMarco and His Unique Album

This year Canadian musician Mac DeMarco released his second studio album, *Salad Days*. Most well-known for his jangly music and funny antics, DeMarco has defined his own musical genre with his second release. *Salad Days* has proved to be an excellent blend of jangle-pop and rock. This review will cover three songs on the album, titled respectively as "Salad Days", "Blue Boy", and "Chamber of Reflection". Each of these songs help to lay the foundation for an album that is truly unique and genuine in its musical style.

The first track, "Salad Days", starts the album off with a very lazy and comfortable sounding guitar and bass melody. The drums follow a basic pattern and keep the beat throughout the song.

The guitar sound used by DeMarco is heavy on the chorus effect, which gives it a very light and heavenly tone, further adding to the comfortable sound of the recording. The lyrics of the song express feelings of yearning to go back to his youth. Singing about how he wishes to return to his "salad days", DeMarco wishes he could return to the carefree life he lived when he was younger, and also be able to visit the people he left behind in the past, like "Hippy John," mentioned in the second verse. The music mimics the lyrics very well in the sense that the music has a very funny and relaxed

tone to it, allowing the listener to remember back to their own salad days. "Blue Boy" is the name of the albums' second track.

Interstellar Review

“Do Not Go Gentle Into That Good Night”

When I left the theater after watching *Interstellar*, three things were reverberating in the depths of my mind. The first was the thought-provoking questions the movie posed, as well as the truly mind-boggling twist that upends everything you thought you knew about the adventure. The second was my own inner turmoil as I struggled to place this sci-fi epic somewhere on the list of Christopher Nolan's greatest films. Did it dethrone *The Dark Knight* or *Inception*, or was it even that good in the first place? The last was I couldn't shake that headache that follows any intriguing movie, a result of the desire to know about the director's inner motives and also to get Han Zimmer's ear-shattering, yet addictive, soundtrack out of my subconscious.

It's been nearly a month since I saw the movie, and I believe, as the awards season draws near, that this is as good a time as any to evaluate one of the year's most ambitiously divisive films.

To start off, was the movie any good? In my opinion, it was exceptional. I was worried going in that Nolan would focus too much on explaining the worlds that he created and stray too far away from the true heroes of the story. However, Nolan navigates around these narrative traps and makes sure the audience is emotionally invested at every step in this seemingly endless journey. In one particularly moving scene, Nolan demonstrates his mastery of blending scientific and emotional story elements into one incredibly moving work of art. During one of the astronauts' missions to examine a planet and see whether or not it can sustain human life, the main characters spend about an hour

trying to battle the nature of the planet and escape with the information they need. In that short span of time, decades pass aboard the ship they left in orbit, and also back on Earth, where the explorers' families feel the inevitable strain of time. Not only does Matthew McConaughey's character realize that he has lost his chance to see his children grow up and even start families of their own through watching some incredibly intense video journals, but he has also caused his family to lose faith in his return home, making him feel immense guilt when staring at the sorrowful faces of his abandoned children. Every character is played perfectly in this movie, emphasizing the hard-hitting consequences of each and every decision made by the crew, which ultimately makes every second of the film engaging.

For instance, McConaughey's daughter Murph, played by Oscar winner Jessica Chastain, is presented as the protagonist on Earth who



felt like an artificial plot device. But perhaps my main problem with the movie is, while it handles its scientific subject matter extraordinarily well, I think it assumes too much of the audience when presenting the topics of interstellar travel. In the beginning, during the first stages of the journey, the explorers took the time to illustrate what they were doing and how the complex process of space travel worked, making it easier and more enjoyable for viewers

Additionally, there is a twist in the middle of the narrative that also left me feeling slightly disappointed, as a central character to the plot makes an ex-

remely harmful decision that endangers the entire operation, one that I felt wasn't justified by his actions beforehand and

and meticulous representation of the subject matter, and its balance of scientific and emotional storylines. So, where does it rank? Before watching this movie I had seen only *The Dark Knight* trilogy, *Inception*, and *Man of Steel* (which I still count on this list because Nolan was listed as the producer). Out of this bunch of stellar movies, my top three would be, in this order: *Inception*, *The Dark Knight*, and then *The Dark Knight Rises*. However, I believe *Interstellar* has the power to knock *Rises* out of its third place spot among my favorite Christopher Nolan films. While it doesn't reach the emotional intensity of *The Dark Knight* or the engagement of the deceptively complex *Inception*, it does hold its own as a unique sci-fi journey. I was amazed at how far *Interstellar* would go and how many boundaries it pushed. The graphics were amazing to look at, the new worlds felt fresh and innovative, and even the ending, while confusing, went in a direction that I thought would be dismissed. I love Christopher Nolan movies because they always make me think, and *Interstellar* is no exception. Here, Nolan has faith in the audience to start questioning deeper ideas and even our future as a species, which is where the narrative truly shines.

One day I hope critics look back and re-evaluate *Interstellar* as the masterpiece it is, and redact some of the negative reviews of the movie. But for now let's hope that the movie goes far during the awards season and earns the recognition it deserves for the boundaries it pushed. Until then, we are clear for takeoff.


